

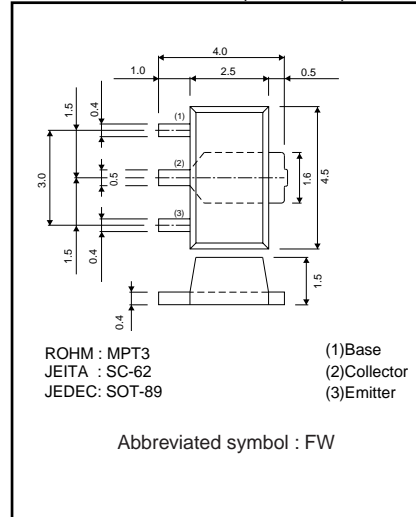

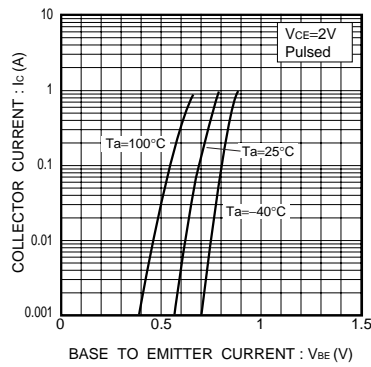


Fig.1 Grounded emitter propagation characteristics

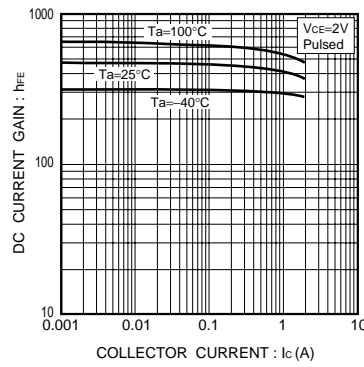


Fig.2 DC current gain vs. collector current

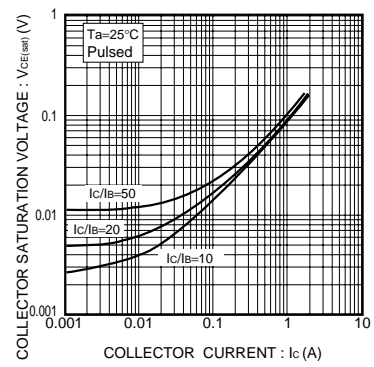


Fig.3 Collector-emitter saturation voltage vs. collector current

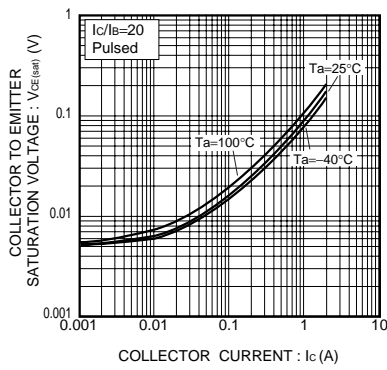


Fig.4 Base-emitter saturation voltage vs. collector current

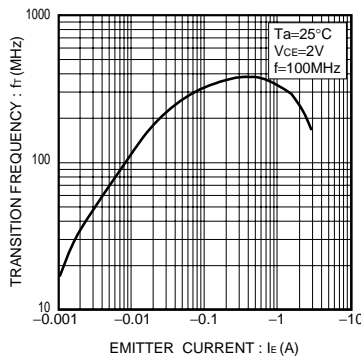


Fig.5 Gain bandwidth product vs. emitter current

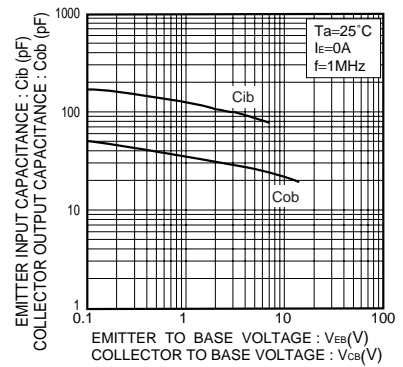


Fig.6 Collector output capacitance vs. collector-base voltage
